**Lord Justice Rabinder Singh**Court of Appeal of England and Wales

Sir Rabinder Singh, styled The Rt. Hon. Lord Justice Singh, is a Court of Appeal Judge of England and Wales and President of the Investigatory Powers Tribunal, formerly a High Court judge of the Queen's Bench Division, a King's Counsel and barrister, formerly a founding member of Matrix Chambers and a legal academic.


Lord Justice Singh will moderate the judges' panel on Sunday.



Judge María Alejandra Mauricio
Third Court of Guarantees
of the Judiciary in Mendoza, Argentina

María Alejandra Mauricio is an Argentinian judge at the Third Court of Guarantees in Mendoza, Argentina.

Judge Alejandra Mauricio was the judge deciding the famous 'Cecilia' case in which the chimpanzee Cecilia was recognized as a legal subject.



Judge Athar Minallah Supreme Court of Pakistan

Athar Minallah is a Pakistani jurist serving as a judge of the Supreme Court of Pakistan since 11 November 2022. Prior to that, he served as the 5th Chief Justice of Islamabad High Court.

Judge Minallah was the judge deciding the 'Kaavan' case, ordering the relocation of the elephant Kaavan and other animals from a zoo to a sanctuary.




Judge Karla Andrade Quevedo Constitutional Court of Ecuador

Professor Andrade Quevedo has been a judge at the Constitutional Court of Ecuador since February 2019. She has a Master and Doctorate in Constitutional Law from the University of Seville in Spain.

Judge Andrade Quevedo was one of the judges deciding the famous 'Estrellita' case, in which a monkey was found to be a subject of rights under the constitutional rights of nature provision.

## Keynote speaker



**Maneesha Deckha** University of Victoria

Maneesha Deckha is Professor and Lansdowne Chair in Law at the University of Victoria in British Columbia, Canada. Her research expertise includes critical animal law, vegan ecofeminist theory, and postcolonial theory.

She has held the Fulbright Visiting Chair in Law and Society at New York University and currently serves as Director of the Animals & Society Research Initiative at the University of Victoria.

Her manuscript entitled Animals as Legal Beings: Contesting Anthropocentric Legal Orders was published by the University of Toronto Press in 2021 and her open access documentary series designed for high school and undergraduate screening, A Deeper Kindness: Youth Activism in Animal Law, launched in October 2022.

Her current monograph project, supported by the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada, examines the lack of government regulation in favour of farmed animals as a rule of law violation and thus a matter of constitutional import.

Professor Deckha is a graduate of McGill University, the University of Toronto Faculty of Law, and Columbia Law School.

### **Presentation**

In her keynote address, Professor Deckha will present her recent paper 'Animalization and Dehumanization Concerns: Another Psychological Barrier to Animal Law Reform', in which she discusses how the fraught race-animal nexus can prevent progressive animal law reform.

## Speakers



**Søren Stig Andersen**University of Copenhagen

Dr Søren Stig Anderson studied law in order to have a professional platform for trying to improve the conditions for animals. He worked, among other places, in the Danish Ministry of Justice, the judiciary, and the Environmental Protection Agency. Currently he works full-time at the University of Copenhagen teaching different legal subjects and trying to establish animal law as a research and educational field.

### **Presentation**

Dr Stig Anderson will discuss the difficulties in acquiring access to courts for animals in the European context.



**Angela Fernandez**University of Toronto

Dr Angela Fernandez is a Full Professor at the Faculty of Law at the University of Toronto where she teaches animal law. She is the author of *Pierson v. Post, The Hunt for the Fox* (CUP, 2018) and numerous other works. She oversees the *Brooks Animal Law Digest: Canada Edition* with Krystal-Anne Roussel. Angela sits on the Board of Advisors and is a Director of Animal Justice Canada.

### **Presentation**

Dr Fernandez will discuss the question of who can speak for animals in court and issues relating to the representation of animals generally.



Sabine Brels
International animal lawyer

Dr Sabine Brels is a lawyer dedicated to advancing animal protection laws worldwide. She teaches international animal law and published books on animal-related issues in French and English. Over the last 10 years, she directed the Global Animal Law Project, and worked for the World Federation for Animals and the Eurogroup for Animals. She is currently working as an international animal law consultant for various organisations.

### **Presentation**

Dr Brels will discuss how to improve animal protection law worldwide, drawing on her experience as an animal lawyer.

## Speakers



**Kathy Hessler** George Washington University Law School

Kathy Hessler is the inaugural Assistant Dean for the Animal Legal Education Initiative at George Washington University Law School. Dean Hessler has been teaching animal law for 22 years. She is the first law professor hired to teach animal law full-time. She helped develop the Center for Animal Law Studies at Lewis & Clark Law School, directed the Animal Law Clinic, created and directed the Aquatic Animal Law Initiative.

### **Presentation**

Dean Hessler will discuss the significance of the Tilikum case for animal law in the US and discuss the lessons we can learn from this case.



**Edie Bowles**Advocates for Animals

Edie Bowles is a solicitor and the Managing Director of Advocates for Animals. She has advised almost all of the main animal protection organisations, smaller organisations and individuals across all animal protection law and campaigning. She often speaks on animal protection issues and has done so in the UK Parliament, the French Senate, and the East African Legislative Assembly.

### **Presentation**

Edie Bowles will discuss the status of animals as property in litigation, drawing on her experience with her organization Advocates for Animals.



Joe Wills
University of Leicester

Dr Joe Wills is a Lecturer in Law at the University of Leicester and Leverhulme Trust Research Fellow. He has published widely on the legal status of animals, animal sentience and the common law, and non-anthropocentric jurisprudence. He is also working on a Leverhulme-funded monograph on the legal status of animals in Britain. Dr Wills has drafted and co-ordinated amicus curiae briefs in support of litigation for animals.

### **Presentation**

Dr Wills will introduce the panel of judges with a discussion of animal rights litigation, outlining some of the theoretical and practical considerations underpinning such litigation.

## Speakers



John Adenitire Queen Mary University of London

Dr John Adenitire is a Senior Lecturer in the Queen Mary University of London, School of Law and a Fellow of the Institute of Humanities and Social Sciences. He completed his PhD at the University of Cambridge. He has taught and researched at Cambridge, Durham, Birmingham, the UCL Constitution Unit, the Bingham Centre for the Rule of Law, and the UK Commission on a Bill of Rights.

### **Presentation**

Dr Adenitire will discuss animals in constitutionalism, presenting a chapter from the book he is writing together with Dr Raffael Fasel.



**Elien Verniers**Ghent University

Dr Elien Verniers is a postdoctoral researcher at the Law Faculty of the University of Ghent (Belgium), where she teaches the course Animal & Law. In October 2022 she obtained her doctoral degree with her thesis 'Towards new legal instruments for animal welfare'. During her academic career she received several awards such as the 2022 VDK-Bank award, the 2022 CCARL Essay award and the 2021 Young Legal Researcher award.

### **Presentation**

Dr Verniers will discuss constitutional protection of animals in different European countries, including Finland.



**Birgitta Wahlberg** Åbo Akademi University

Dr Birgitta Wahlberg is working as
University Lecturer in Public Law at Åbo
Akademi University, Department of Law,
in Finland. She has written the first
textbook in animal law on the animal
protection legislation in Finland. She is
the founder of the AniLex program
(https://blogs2.abo.fi/anilex/), the Global
Journal of Animal Law (GJAL), and cofounder and President of the Finnish
Animal Rights Law Society.

### **Presentation**

Dr Wahlberg will discuss the Bill on Fundamental Rights in Finland, drafted by the Finnish Animal Rights Law Society.
